Results: 80% of respondents predict 2010 will have a higher volume of Chapter 11 and Chapter 7 bankruptcies as compared to 2009.

BankruptcyData.com reported that 207 publicly-traded companies filed for bankruptcy in the US in 2009 up from 138 in 2008. "2009 ranks as the 3rd largest annual total since 1980—preceded only by 2001 and 2002, with respective filing counts of 263 and 220," according to *BankruptcyData.com*.

From the Chair

Dear IWIRC Colleagues:

The IWIRC board committees are the way everything gets done at the global level. Over the last few months the board has spent a good deal of time talking about ways to increase the interaction between the committees and members. The three committees I will write about today are great examples of how we are progressing against that objective.

The Member Services committee is responsible for the membership directory, which is now electronic, as well as for periodically surveying members to gauge their attitudes on a range of issues. In addition, this committee manages the list of volunteers and passes those names on to other committees who need to build up their resources. I am pleased to report that the list of volunteers had reached almost 150 names toward the end of 2009 so clearly our members are enthusiastic about getting more involved!

This year the **Member Services** committee will try to undertake more regular surveys with the objective of ferreting out developing issues and attitudes in the market that may create the basis for some type of intellectual capital (commentary on our website, for example) or for press releases that could lead to media interviews of IWIRC members who are experts on those topics. Building visibility for IWIRC and its members is one important strategy for 2010. Becoming known as an organization with valuable restructuring expertise elevates the value of membership for all of us. In addition, the Member Services committee plans to drive our electronic directory to the next level this year. We are aiming at getting full profiles of every member, including a photo and member-defined key words that will make it easy for potential clients to find precisely the expertise they are looking for. Please watch for the request from Member Services and provide the information that will help you get more leads!

The **Program Committee** puts together three major programs every year – the Spring Conference, which takes place immediately before the ABI Spring Conference and at which we award the Founders Awards; the Leadership Summit, which is now a roving regional event and at which the board and Network Chairs spend two days discussing strategy and tactics for making IWIRC better; and the Fall Conference, which takes place immediately before the NCBJ and at which the Woman of the Year in Restructuring (WOYR) is awarded.

In addition to these conferences, the Program Committee is developing a series of regional meetings that will draw together more of our members who don't attend the major conferences. For example, we have the opportunity this year to host a reception for two meetings organized by the Federal Judicial Center for bankruptcy judges. The first will be in Miami in March and the second will be in San Francisco in July. These meetings typically draw more than 100 judges and will be fabulous opportunities to get know the judges better, as well as to catch up with each other. The **Recruiting Committee** plays the vital role of attracting new members to IWIRC. Members represent the “revenue line” of IWIRC so it is an area that requires good management. During the “member sale” (ends March 31st), the Recruiting Committee has been focused on promoting the great deal IWIRC is offering. These efforts include

Q&A: MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

IWIRC Speaks - A Virtual Coffee with Catherine Vance and Judge Fitzgerald

How many times have you been to an insolvency related conference and sat through numerous all male panels? Have you ever attended an all female panel at such a conference? Chances are you have endured numerous all male panels, and no all female panels, but you can rattle off the names of dozens of intelligent, successful female professionals who would make fantastic speakers. Promoting those professional women you just thought of and providing them with speaking opportunities in both insolvency and non-insolvency forums is the goal of the developing IWIRC Speakers Bureau ("Speakers Bureau" or "Bureau").

In the spring of 2008, while both were attending the annual William J. O'Neill Regional Bankruptcy Institute, [Catherine Vance](#) ("Cathy") of [Development Specialists, Inc.](#) ("DSI") and Judge Judith Fitzgerald of the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Western District of PA ("Judge Fitzgerald") discussed developing projects focusing on the advancement of women in the restructuring profession. The women agreed to continue brainstorming individually, and in the spring of 2009 when they met up again, this time at the Commercial Law League of America's annual conference in Chicago, Cathy suggested the creation of a Speakers' Bureau. Judge Fitzgerald, a long-time IWIRC member, identified IWIRC as the perfect platform for Cathy's idea because IWIRC offers many opportunities for the advancement and mentoring of women. Cathy met with members of IWIRC's Communications Committee this past fall in Las Vegas to discuss implementation of the idea.

Since October 2009, the Speakers' Bureau has been added to IWIRC's "to-do" list and has found a home within the Liaison Subcommittee of the Communications Committee. The quick turn-around from Cathy's presentation to the Communications Committee in October to the establishment of a home within a subcommittee for further development stands as an example to other IWIRC members that the organization is willing and able to implement new methods of advancement when members present ideas like Cathy's.

Cathy and Judge Fitzgerald envision the Speakers Bureau as a resource providing information about IWIRC members who have a particular expertise or knowledge of a subject area with the ability to convey the information in an interesting way. In the most basic form, the Speakers Bureau will provide names of potential speakers, contact information and various topics on which such speaker is qualified to present. Topics on which a professional may speak may include insolvency issues, but also non-insolvency topics such as ethics and professionalism or management of work-life balance. As Judge Fitzgerald points out, providing women with more opportunities to present on panels will aid women in their marketing and business development efforts.

When discussing the impact of a Speakers Bureau, Cathy said she hopes the Bureau will (1) provide a reliable resource for adding diversity to panels which will also serve to highlight the number of talented female restructuring professionals; (2) create additional publicity for IWIRC as an organization; and (3) provide IWIRC with attention outside the restructuring community. Judge Fitzgerald echoes these hopes, adding that she hopes the Speakers' Bureau will also provide more opportunities for public service including the development of mentoring relationships and the encouragement of young women through methods such as presentations at high schools. As the Bureau develops, it may be utilized by law schools for career development programs or even law firms looking for continuing legal education programs. The potential seems limitless.

Currently, the Speakers Bureau is "under construction" within the Liaison Subcommittee of the IWIRC Communications Committee. Cathy, Chair of the Liaison Subcommittee, is actively looking for energetic and creative committee members to promote the aforementioned goals to further develop the idea, establish guidelines for membership, develop a marketing plan, design the Bureau's layout on the IWIRC website and otherwise work to get this project up and running. Current members of the Liaison Subcommittee include Judge Fitzgerald, Elizabeth Lynch of DSI, Paige Ellerman of Taft Stettinius & Hollister, LLP, Victoria Powers of Schottenstein Zox & Dunn Co., L.P.A., and Kari Coniglio of Benesch, Friedlander, Coplan & Aronoff, LLP.

Can I Get My Stuff Back?

Reconciling Reclamation And Reorganization

Early in life most of us learned the lesson that “Life is not always fair.” However, as insolvency lawyers, we spend our time before Bankruptcy Courts, which the U. S. Supreme Court has acknowledged is a Court of Equity (Continental Illinois Nat. Bank & Trust Co. of Chicago v. Chicago, R.I. & P. Ry. Co., 294 U. S. 648, 675, 55 S. Ct. 595 (1935)). Thus, we presume that fairness will be valued in this forum. The problem is, what appears fair to one individual may look quite unfair to another. This has been at the root of the dilemma of reconciling reclamation claims and the goals of reorganization of debtors in bankruptcy. The result has been essentially a trade-off, payment in full of some goods (those received within 20 days of the bankruptcy filing) and pro-rata payment of the balance, in exchange for letting the Debtor keep and sell all items received prepetition.

As a pure proposition under contract law, if Sally sold 1000 purses to Barb, but Barb failed to pay the agreed price for those purses, then Sally should be able to get the court to rule that Barb owes Sally the amount of the purchase price. That, after all, was the agreed consideration due from Barb in the deal. However, the commercial reality is that Sally likely sold the purses to Barb based on wholesale prices and Barb is going to resell the purses at retail, so they are worth even more in Barb’s hands. Additionally, depending on which starlet was photographed carrying a Sally-style purse this month, the value could fluctuate a great deal in the world of those who care about the latest fashion. That is where the Uniform Commercial Code came in and gave sellers like Sally the option to either get the value of the purses or go pick up the purses. Chapter 2 of the Uniform Commercial Code, Section 2-702 grants a right of reclamation- the right to go and get your stuff back, when an ordinary course seller finds out she delivered goods to an insolvent buyer. Thus if Barb was insolvent when she received the purses, but Sally didn’t know it, Sally has to make a demand within 10 days of receipt to have the option of getting the purses back. Outside of the Bankruptcy Court, this remedy can be very effective as long as Barb still has the purses in her possession.

The problem is that, when the Debtor is seeking to reorganize, she needs the merchandise she has on her shelves. Under Section 546 (h) of the Bankruptcy Code, returning the goods with the seller’s consent subject to prior rights of holders of security interest in the goods or their proceeds, within the first 6 months of the case, is an option available for the Trustee or Debtor-In-Possession, albeit rarely exercised. Most often Debtors have every intention of selling or using the goods purchased and thus the reclamation creditor will end up with a claim, not her goods. What the Seller needs to do is make a written claim of reclamation for goods sold on credit within 45 days of their receipt, but no later than 20 days after the Petition Date. The claim should show the full amount due, have clear documentation showing the value and dates of receipt of the goods, a split, if necessary, of the portion attributable to goods, as opposed to services (like installation) and separately account for goods sold and received within 45 days and the portion attributable to goods received within 20 days of the Petition.

In many of the large cases (such as Circuit City in DE and Pilgrim’s Pride in TX) Debtor’s counsel are now adding more hoops for reclamation creditors to jump through by seeking reclamation procedures orders in the first few days of the case. Failing to follow the procedures adopted could cost your client the benefit of the reclamation provisions. Additionally, some Debtors’ attorneys are trying to assert offsets of preference claims or argue disallowance of Section 503(b)(9) claims under Section 502(d), barring allowance of a claim when the claimant has not returned an avoidable preference payment to the estate. Neither of these attacks have merit. For a good analysis of why Section 502(d) is not a defense to a properly asserted 503(b)(9) reclamation claim, read Judge Mary Grace Diehl’s historical review and analysis in the recent case of Southern Polymer, Inc. v TI Acquisition, LLC (In re TI Acquisition, LLC), 2009 WL 2835200 (Bkrctcy.

N.D. Ga.). Judge Diehl walks through the logic and interplay of Sections 546(c), 503(b) (9) and the inapplicability of a Section 502(d) challenge to this statutory claim.

Lastly, brace your client for the reality that she will likely not get her money anytime soon. Several courts, including the Georgia court in TI Acquisition, LLC, have pointed out that 546 (c) only grants an administrative priority claim, but does not mandate a time of payment. As Section 1129(a) (9) provides that all administrative claims must be paid on the effective date of the plan, any earlier payment of an administrative claim is within the discretion of the court. So, don't waste your client's money seeking a motion to compel prompt payment. Instead, see if the Debtor will agree to a sooner payment in connection with credit terms of the sale of goods during the reorganization. If your client still has something the Debtor needs to buy, you have leverage for an agreement.
